



Completing your program if you started under old requirements

All students who declared their major after the publication of the 2010-2011 University Calendar must complete their program under the new requirements. Students who declared their major before the publication of the 2010-2011 University Calendar may complete their program under either the new requirements or the requirements that were in place when they declared their major.

For students who began their program under old requirements but wish to complete it under the new requirements:

- ENGL 2000Y satisfies the English program requirement for at least 0.5 credit at the 3000 level from Theory and Criticism (series 6.0), but does not count as a “credit beyond the 2000 level” to satisfy degree requirements.
- ENGL 2200Y satisfies the English program requirement for ENGL 3210Y, but does not count as a “credit beyond the 2000 level” to satisfy degree requirements
- ENGL 2300Y counts as a credit from series 3.0 (American) to satisfy English program requirements, but does not count as a “credit beyond the 200 level” to satisfy degree requirements.
- ENGL 2400Y counts as 0.5 credit from series 4.0 (Modern British) and 0.5 credit from series 4.5 (World) to satisfy English program requirements, but does not count as a “credit beyond the 2000 level” to satisfy degree requirements
- ENGL 2500Y counts as a credit from series 5.0 (Canadian) to satisfy English program requirements, but does not count as a “credit beyond the 2000 level” to satisfy degree requirements

<i>New requirements</i>	<i>How cancelled courses count towards them</i>
2 credits consisting of ENGL 2100Y and 3210Y	ENGL 2200Y satisfies the requirement for ENGL 3210Y
At least 0.5 credit at the 3000 level from the Theory and Criticism series (series 6.0)	ENGL 2000Y satisfies this requirement
At least 1.5 credits at the 3000 level including credits from three of the following four series: American (series 3.0), Modern British (series 4.0), World (series 4.5), and Canadian (series 5.0)	ENGL 2300Y counts as a course from American (series 3.0) ENGL 2400Y counts as a course from either Modern British (series 4.0) or World (series 4.5). ENGL 2500Y counts as course from Canadian (series 5.0)

For students who began their program under the old requirements and wish to complete it under the old requirements:

- The requirement for 1.0 credit from ENGL 2000Y can be satisfied with 0.5 credit from ENGL 2001H and 0.5 credit from series 6.0 (Theory)
- The requirement for 1.0 credit from ENGL 2200Y can be satisfied with 1.0 from ENGL 3210Y
- The requirement for 1.0 credit from one of ENGL 2300Y, 2400Y or 2500Y can be satisfied with 1.0 credit at the 3000 level from any of the following series: American (series 3.0), Modern British (series 4.0), World (series 4.5), and Canadian (series 5.0). This is an opportunity to mix and match courses from different categories.

**Old Program Requirements
2007-2009**

The following are the basic requirements for a degree for students who declared their major before the publication of the 2010-2011 Academic Calendar. Remember: The Academic Calendar is the University's official, legally binding document and you must consult it before making any final decisions about your program.

The single-major Honours program. At least 10 credits in ENGL, including:

- 1 credit from ENGL 1000Y (formerly 100) or ENGL 1003H and 1005H in Oshawa
- 3 credits consisting of ENGL 2000Y (formerly 205), 2100Y and 2200Y
- 1 credit from ENGL 2300Y, 2400Y or 2500Y
- 5 additional ENGL credits

The joint-major Honours program. At least 8 credits in ENGL, including:

- 1 credit from ENGL 1000Y (formerly 100) or ENGL 1003H and 1005H in Oshawa
- 3 credits consisting of ENGL 2000Y (formerly 205), 2100Y and 2200Y
- 1 credit from ENGL 2300Y, 2400Y or 2500Y
- 3 additional ENGL credits

The single-major General program. At least 6 credits in ENGL, including:

- 1 credit from ENGL 1000Y (formerly 100) or ENGL 1003H and 1005H in Oshawa

- 1 credit consisting of ENGL 2000Y (formerly 205)
- 1 credit from ENGL 2100Y or 2200Y
- 1 credit from ENGL 2300Y, 2400Y or 2500Y
- 2 additional ENGL credits

The joint-major General program or minor. At least 5 credits in ENGL, including:

- 1 credit in ENGL 1000Y (formerly 100) or in ENGL 1003H and 1005H in Oshawa
- 1 credit in ENGL 2000Y (formerly 205)
- 1 credit in ENGL 2100Y or 2200Y
- 1 credit in ENGL 2300Y, 2400Y or 2500Y
- 1 additional ENGL credit

Students completing their program under the old requirements:

- May count ENGL 3210Y as ENGL 2200Y to satisfy the English program requirements.
- May satisfy the requirement for ENGL 2000Y with 1.0 credit consisting of ENGL 2001H and 0.5 credit from the 3600 or 4600 series.

For students who declared their major before 2006

The following are the basic requirements for a degree for students who declared their major before the end of the 2005-2006 academic year. In addition to ENGL 1000Y and ENGL 2000Y (or 205), requirements were based on completion of a selection of courses from a number of "categories" which corresponded to historical periods in the history of literature in English (with the exception of category "E" in which courses spanned periods). For descriptions of individual courses, including prerequisites, please consult the current Academic Calendar. And remember: The Academic Calendar is the University's official, legally binding document and you must consult it before making any final decisions about your program.

The single-major Honours degree

At least 10 credits in English, including:

- ENGL1000Y (formerly 100) or ENGL1003H and 1005H in Oshawa
- ENGL2000Y (formerly 205)
- 8 additional credits, including at least 0.5 credit in each of the 6 categories

The joint-major Honours

At least 8 credits in English, including:

- ENGL1000Y (formerly 100) or ENGL1003H and 1005H in Oshawa
- ENGL2000Y (formerly 205)
- 6 additional credits, including at least 0.5 credit in 5 different categories

The single-major General

At least 6 credits in English, including:

- ENGL1000Y (formerly 100) or ENGL1003H and 1005H in Oshawa
- ENGL2000Y (formerly 205)

- 4 additional credits, including at least 0.5 credit in 4 different categories, at least 2 different categories from to C, and at least 2 different categories from D to F

The joint-major General (and minor)

At least 5 credits in English, including:

- ENGL1000Y (formerly 100) or ENGL1003H and 1005H in Oshawa
- ENGL2000Y (formerly 205)
- 3 additional credits, including at least 0.5 credit in 3 different categories, at least 1 category from to C, and at least 1 category from D to F
