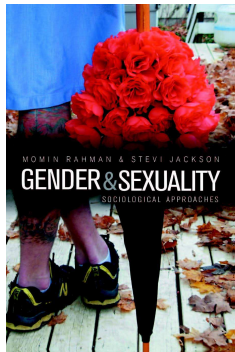

What kind of job can I get with a degree in Sociology?

Many career options are available for Sociology graduates, including:

Public Service Commission of Canada: Staffing of federal departments and agencies, such as Human Resources and Skills Development Canada. Occupations in the private, public, and non-profit sector including, but not limited to, social researcher, policy analyst, program evaluator, performance auditor, field researcher, communications officer, youth worker, human rights officer, and media analyst.

A stepping stone to degrees required for work in, for example, corrections, teaching, justice, human resources, public relations, social work, and public administration.

Degree Requirements

Students require twenty credits in order to graduate with a four year B.A. Honours in Sociology. Students wishing to complete a General (three year) B.A. degree in Sociology are required to have a total of fifteen credits in their program. The following is a quick checklist of the basic requirements for each degree.

B.A. General (Single Major)

15 credits, including the following 6 credits: 3 SOCI credits consisting of 1000Y, 2110H, 2150Y, and one of 3111H or 3100H and 3 SOCI credits in addition to the above, at least 1.5 beyond the 2000-level.

B.A. General (Joint Major)

15 credits including the following 5 credits: 3 SOCI credits consisting of 1000Y, 2110H, 2150Y and one of 3111H or 3100H and 2 SOCI credits in addition to the above, at least 0.5 beyond the 2000-level.

B.A. Honours (Single Major)

20 credits, including the following 10 credits: 4 SOCI credits consisting of SOCI 1000Y, 2110H, 2150Y, 3111H, 3100H, and 3160H and 2.0 SOCI credits at the 4000-level and 4 SOCI credits in addition to the above, at least 2 beyond the 2000-level.

B.A. Honours (Joint Major)

20 credits including the following 7.5 credits: 3.5 SOCI credits consisting of SOCI 1000Y, 2110H, 2150Y, 3160H, and one of 3111H or 3100H AND 1 SOCI credit at the 4000-level and 3 SOCI credits in addition to the above, at least 1.5 beyond the 2000-level.

Students should note that the above requirements are valid only for the Sociology Department. For the University requirements, please see the [university calendar](#). Joint-majors should also check the degree requirements for the other discipline involved. Students should be aware that degree regulations valid at the time of entry to the University stand as graduating requirements.
