TCAS’ award-winning membership – faculty, staff, students, and community members – is at the forefront of advancing interdisciplinary aging studies across disciplines in the humanities, social sciences, and the sciences.



Why the TCAS matters

Research & Innovation

The Trent Centre for Aging & Society offers scholars, students, and community partners a place to take part in innovative research, education, and community engagement that challenges ageist policies and practices and is responsive to the issues facing older people and aging communities.

Education and Scholarship

Our research-based curriculum continues to grow, supporting both undergraduate and graduate courses that offer foundations and advanced graduate training. TCAS is home to the M.A. in Interdisciplinary Aging Studies, a thesis-based graduate program that fosters an understanding of key conceptual and methodological foundations of interdisciplinary aging studies, executed from a research and applied perspective. Additionally, our Collaborative Specialization in Aging Studies is open to any graduate student at Trent interested in integrating an understanding of aging into their primary research program.

Age-Friendly Communities

Building on a world-class reputation for leadership in interdisciplinary aging studies, Trent University has become one of a handful of Canadian institutions to have officially joined the Age-Friendly University (AFU) Global Network, an international network of universities committed to recognizing the distinctive contributions institutions of higher education can make to respond to the interests and needs of an aging population. As TCAS grows, our goal is to support Trent in becoming the first truly intergenerational university in Canada.



What are we doing?

Key Objectives

- 1** Cultivate new areas of research through leading programs and curriculum, TCAS Canada Research Chairs and award-winning faculty are mentoring the next generation of aging scholars.
- 2** Foster experiential learning that can help answer society’s most pressing questions and lead to momentous change while developing new intergenerational learning opportunities.
- 3** Share our research outside the walls of the university. The TCAS Knowledge Mobilization Hub supports TCAS research in effectively informing best practices that will support older adults aging in their homes, in communities, and in institutions.
- 4** Share the experiences and knowledge of Indigenous older adults and Elders, particularly highlighting the opportunities associated with incorporating Indigenous ways of knowing about aging into the academic zeitgeist.
- 5** Provide a focal point with which to attract infrastructure and research funding, as well as top tier students, staff, and faculty in this rapidly growing and socially important field.

What is special about TCAS?

Supporting Canada's first intergenerational university campus

With the development of the University-Integrated Seniors Village project, anchored by a 224-bed long-term care home on Trent's Symons campus, a project on which TCAS is the academic lead, Trent students and older Peterborough residents will live and learn together, creating an intergenerational campus environment naturally conducive to challenging ageist misconceptions.

Interdisciplinary aging research

From its home at Trent University, TCAS supports and engages with scholars from the Humanities, Arts, Social Sciences, and Sciences, facilitating a complex and well-rounded understanding of aging and the experiences of older Canadians, with a particular emphasis on interdisciplinary aging research.

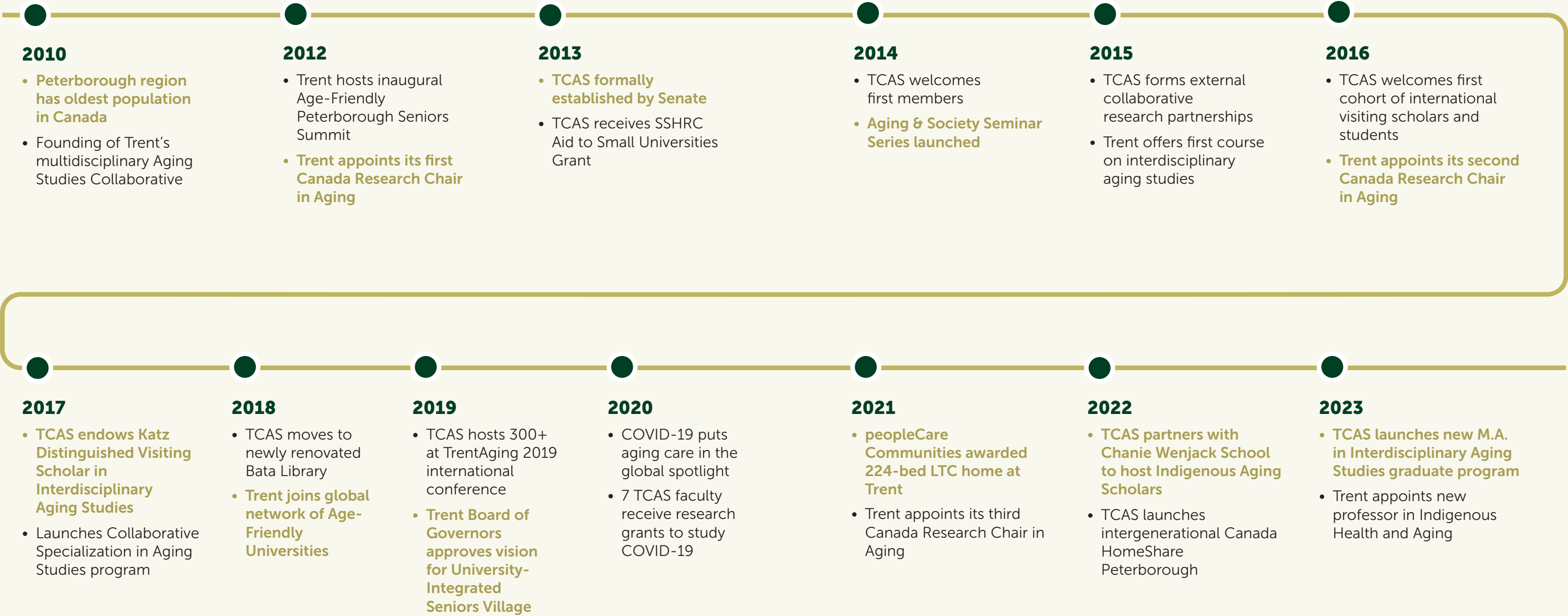


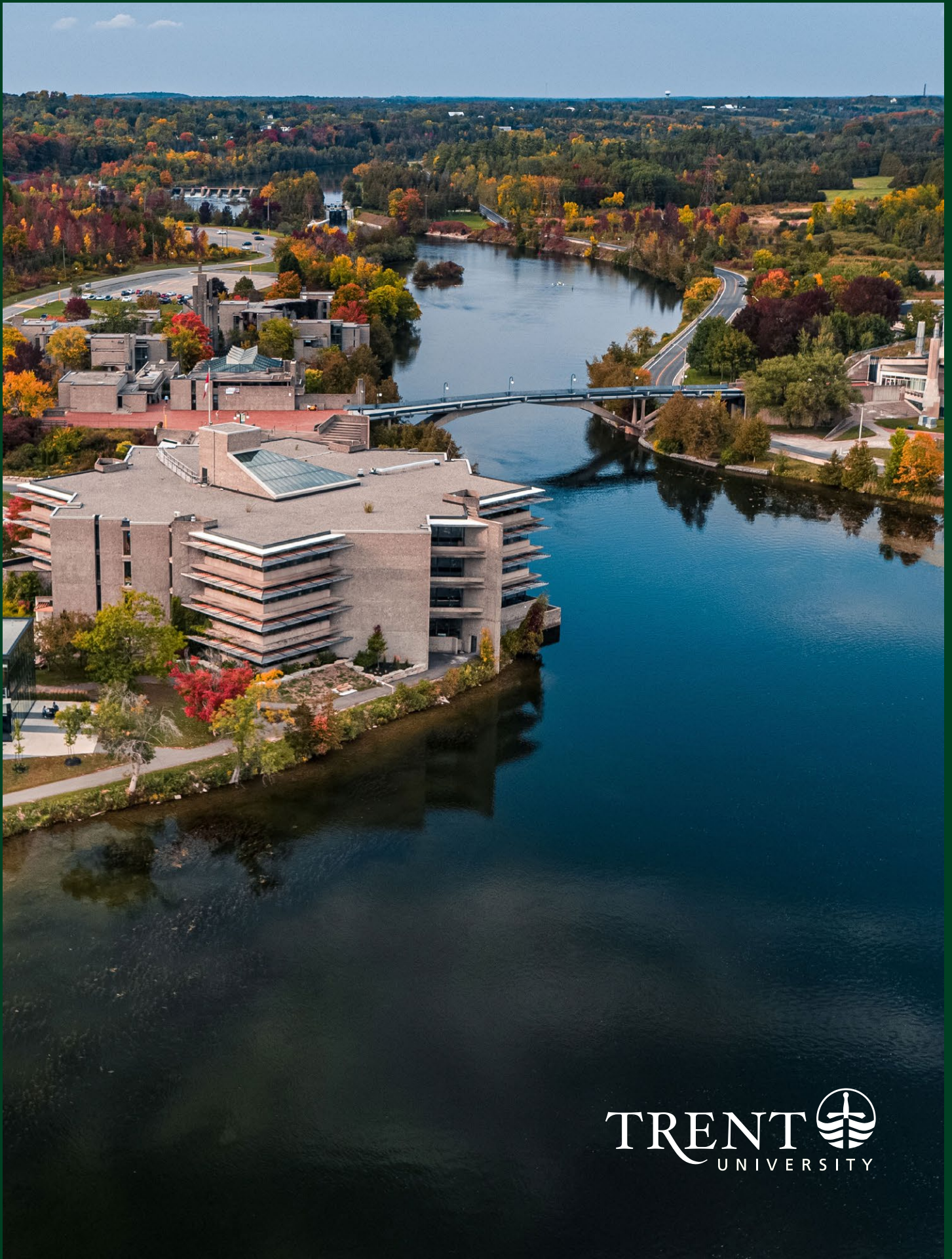
Knowledge mobilization and community connections
