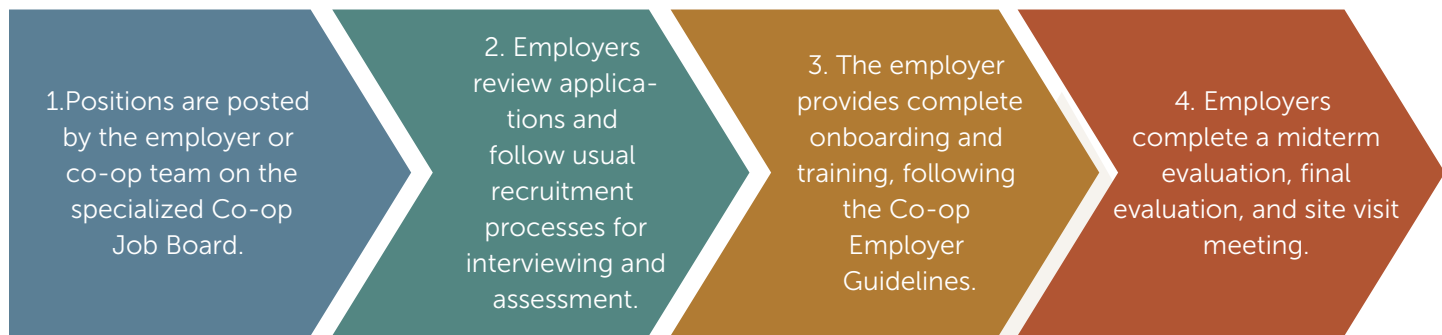

Funding for Co-op Employers

Year-Round Funding Student Work Placement Program (SWPP)

The [Student Work Placement Program](#) is offered by Employment and Social Development Canada through funding delivery partners. Through SWPP, you could receive up to **\$5,000** for every student hired and up to **\$7,000** for students in their first year or from an under-represented group.

Business Benefits Finder

The [Business Benefits Finder](#) is a search tool for Businesses and Not-for-Profits to access funding and services from the Government of Canada to aid growth.

Summer Funding Canada Summer Jobs (CSJ)

[Canada Summer Jobs](#) provides wage subsidies to organizations with less than 50 employees to hire youth aged 15 - 30 in the summer months. **Not-for-Profits** can receive up to **100%** of minimum hourly wage and associated Mandatory Employment Related Costs (MERCs). **Businesses** can receive up to **50%** of minimum hourly wage.

Young Canada Works

[Young Canada Works in Heritage Organizations](#) and [Young Canada Works in Both Official Languages](#) offers wage subsidies for work placements. They may offer between **50%** and **75%** to cover costs depending on criteria.

Tax Credits & Incentives Ontario Co-operative Education Tax Credit

The [Ontario Co-operative Education Tax Credit](#) is available to organizations in Ontario who hire students enrolled in a post-secondary co-op program. The tax credit covers up to **25%** to **30%** of the eligible expenditures, including wages, with a maximum of \$3,000.
