Misplaced, Squinting, and Dangling Modifiers

Answer key

1. **What is wrong?** Dangling modifier. “Running down the street” is closest to the noun “backpack” so is assumed to apply to it, rather than to Jake.
Corrected version: As he ran down the street, Jake’s backpack bounced behind him.

2. **What is wrong?** Misplaced prepositional phrase/modifier. The children are not on paper plates. The sandwiches are.
Corrected version: She served sandwiches on paper plates to the children.

3. **What is wrong?** Misplaced modifier. The coach is not covered in mud, presumably. The players are, but the phrase “covered in mud” is closest to the noun “coach” and is assumed to apply to it.
Corrected version: The coach scolded the players who were covered in mud.

4. **What is wrong?** Squinting modifier. It is unclear whether he will call his friend after the game or if he said it after the game.
Corrected version: He said, “After the game, I will call my friend.”

5. **What is wrong?** Misplaced modifier. The dog has three legs, not the park.
Corrected version: We found a dog with three legs in the park.

6. **What is wrong?** Misplaced modifier. The tire swing is hanging from the tree...we are not.
Corrected version: We saw a tire swing hanging from the tree.

7. **What is wrong?** Squinting modifier. It is unclear whether the test was easy yesterday or if the teacher said it would be easy yesterday.
Corrected version: Yesterday, the teacher said that tomorrow’s test would be easy.

8. **What is wrong?** Squinting modifier. Did she only lend her sister five dollars, or did she lend only five dollars? Did she do something else as well or is this a commentary on the amount of money?
Corrected version: She loaned her sister only five dollars.

9. **What is wrong?** Rain cannot drive.
Corrected version: When I was driving to school, the rain soaked my clothes.

10. **What is wrong?** Trees cannot walk. They also cannot whisper, but we’ll allow for poetic license here.
Corrected version: As we walked through the park at sunset, the trees seemed to whisper their secrets.
