Trent offers a unique suite of programs in the School of Education from undergraduate education stream programming to Bachelor of Education options, Additional Qualifications, and a Masters in Educational Studies. Our guiding principles of social justice, ecologically sustainable practices, Indigenous Knowledge infusion, and content teaching excellence, form the core of our theory, practice, and pedagogy. We care about our students, and insist on high quality engaging programs and experiential learning through community outreach, placements and practicum opportunities. One-to-one interactions with faculty and staff create an experience that is both professional and personal.

The School of Education hosts an incredibly active set of programs as we continually look for new ways to engage students in highly collaborative settings, that provide the necessary tools and support for students entering a competitive education market. Knowing this, our students also walk away with a breadth of knowledge and experiences that stretch beyond the classroom, that can be utilized in a variety of education-related fields.

With extensive in-class teaching time, collaborative opportunities and unique alternative field experience placements, students will enter education fields with a breadth of knowledge that is richer than many other education experiences.

Teaching and learning that promotes inclusivity is based on a commitment to equity, diversity and environmental sustainability.

An effective education leads to critical engagement, agency and active citizenship.

Effective teaching practices are
 based on sound educational
 theory and research.

On-going meaningful feedback drives high quality teaching and learning experiences.

For the purposes of deep learning and continued growth, educators engage in critically reflective practice.

Creative thinking and in-depth subject knowledge underpin learning.

Respect and appreciation for Indigenous Knowledges, perspectives and pedagogies is central to teaching and learning.

HIGHLIGHTS

Trent School of Education Virtual School

As school boards worked tirelessly to prepare for incoming students, teacher candidates eagerly awaited to find out whether they would be teaching in-person, virtually, or at all. Recognizing the challenges that all of those in education were facing, the School of Education quickly pivoted to create a space for a small group of teacher candidates for whom teaching placements could not be secured.

Speaking about the program, instructor and Trent Virtual School of Education (TVSoE) coordinator Lloyd Schoenmaker explains, "The vision for the TVSoE placement was to provide TCs with practical experiences in lesson planning and lesson delivery in an online, micro-teaching setting by creating the environment and structure for delivering lessons to peers."

There were also daily, weekly, and monthly themes and challenges to help TCs build healthy habits around nutrition, movement, stress reduction, sleep, and mindfulness

The goal, supported by research, is that when TCs learn to embed wellness into their careers at the early stage, they are able to continue those habits when teaching, thus reducing teacher burnout and also enabling them to model well-being for their students.

TC feedback was overwhelmingly positive and we look to expand the program!

Indigenous Bachelor of Education Programs Reaches Five-Years

In the Fall of 2016, the Indigenous Bachelor of Education Program (IBEP) in the School of Education welcomed its first cohort of students; working towards becoming certified educators in Ontario. A unique concurrent opportunity, the program offers eligible students' credit for their past educational and life experiences. For Indigenous students who have been historically made to feel that becoming an educator was not an option to them, students are provided with many pathways in; either entering from high school, transfer agreements with local community colleges or First Nations education institutes, or for current Trent students, the ability to transfer into the program.

In June 2021, graduates and new teachers Holly Redden, Thomas Morningstar, Seanna Dale and Amber Brooks became the first graduates of the IBEP program; ready and eager to teach, and for some,



back in their home communities. Of the many pathways into the program, Seanna entered into the Foundations of Indigenous Learning Diploma Program through the Chanie Wenjack School for Indigenous Studies, and after graduating transferred into the IBEP. "There are so many great things I can do with this degree, and although it is next to impossible to predict the future, my ultimate goal is to be a grade 2 teacher to provide a safe space for everyone by sharing my indigenous knowledge and learnings", said Seanna.

Finding Success in Teaching & Learning Through Adversity: Celebrating teaching excellence in the School of Education

Like many students and educators, this past year brought many challenges when navigating the field of teaching and learning; what would it look like for students and teachers? What would it look like for teacher candidates working towards certification? With hands-on learning experiences such as teaching in the classroom a key requirement of the program, teacher candidates showcased they were ready to adapt; to make the best of an unprecedented situation, making this year's annual teaching awards that much more special.

Finding positives

For year two teacher candidates completing the program, they had the unique circumstance of teaching in the classroom (in-person) pre-pandemic, transitioning into pandemic teaching (virtual and in-person). This provided teacher candidates experiences that would ultimately shape their teaching pedagogy to suit what will be a new landscape in education. Recipient of the 2021 Primary/Junior Mathematics award, teacher candidate Ms. Marissa McCrae, had this to say about her experience:

"Although this year was not what I initially hoped for, taking the unique opportunity to go back to my third placement, a virtual kindergarten class, for my fourth and final practicum was an incredible way for me to end my program. Seeing the amount of growth and impact that I had on my students in a virtual setting solidified my belief that I am in the right profession. I am so grateful to have had the opportunity to experience virtual teaching as I can say, with confidence, that I am a flexible, engaging, enthusiastic, and committed educator, and I am looking forward to my future as a teacher!"

Navigating the complexities of fulfilling the requirements of placement hours when mentorship in schools shifted due to stay-at-home orders, illness or other unforeseen factors, practicum manager Adrian Ash was extremely proud in how teacher candidates dealt with adversity proactively and constructively. "I think they've demonstrated a level of flexibility and responsiveness that often serves as an example to everyone – even those of us who have many more years of experience in education", said Mr. Ash. "Many of our associate teacher partners have reported back to me this year a feeling of great satisfaction at seeing their teacher candidate bringing unique perspectives and creative problem-solving to their placement this year."

Celebrating teaching excellence

On April 20, faculty, staff and students from the Bachelor of Education program joined for a virtual celebration to honour this year's teaching recipients. Thinking back on the year, Claire Mooney, acting dean of Education, Teaching & Learning said, "Trent's teacher candidates truly exemplify what it means to be an educator. This year they have responded flexibly, cooperatively, and with humility and good humour to an immensely challenging situation. They have worked alongside, been supported by, and supported Associate Teachers as everyone has learned how to develop and refine teaching and learning within a remote environment. I could not be prouder of the achievements of our Teacher Candidates, faculty and staff."
