ABOUT CHANIE WENJACK

Chanie Wenjack was a young Anishinaabe boy from Ogoki Post in Marten Falls in northern Ontario. He attended Cecilia Jeffrey Indian Residential School near Kenora. Chanie attended the school for two years and ran away on October 16, 1966. He was headed home when he died of exposure on October 23, 1966 on the railway tracks near Redditt, Ontario, the home of his uncle.

Chanie is the namesake of Trent University's Wenjack Theatre and the Chanie Wenjack School for Indigenous Studies – as an homage to his flight to safety, and the safe space created for Indigenous knowledges, perspectives and communities at Trent.

Trent University respectfully acknowledges it is located on the treaty and traditional territory of the Michi Saagig Anishinaabeg. We offer our gratitude to First Peoples for their care for, and teachings about, our earth and our relations. May we honour those teachings.

Established in the early 1980s, the Indigenous Education Council, which includes Indigenous community members, faculty, staff, and students from Trent, ensures that the University engages with the Indigenous communities in the area in a meaningful way, and that the needs of the community are being met.

At Trent, you will thrive and benefit from an academic and supportive environment where Indigenous knowledge is respected and recognized as a means by which to understand the world.

- Experience cross-cultural learning, blending Indigenous and Western knowledge and approaches

The concept of understanding the world in multiple ways is deeply embedded in various Indigenous nations. Haudenosaunee people describe this concept in their two row wampum teachings, Maliseet people refer to this as "two eyed seeing," and Dene people refer to this concept as "strong like two."

Traditional Teachings

Traditional teachings are provided by Elders, traditional teachers, and other Indigenous community members and knowledge holders in an informal setting throughout the year. You can participate in traditional teachings, Elder roundtable workshops, social gatherings, hands-on learning workshops and one-on-one cultural counselling on campus led by visiting Elders and traditional teachers every two weeks.

First Peoples House of Learning

The First Peoples House of Learning (FPHL) at Trent University is a community of learners coming together to understand ourselves, each other, and the world we live in. FPHL provides a home away from home for Indigenous students from all over the world, as well as services, training and support for Two-Spirit youth. For non-Indigenous students, it's a place to build awareness and to become immersed in new and traditional cultural experiences. All students at Trent's Peterborough and Durham GTA campuses are invited to experience and learn about Indigenous knowledges in a comfortable, safe environment.

FPHL offers a wide range of support and inclusive services for your time at Trent, including:

- Cultural counsellors who provide services that respect the dignity and value of all people
- Academic and admissions assistance including tutoring for Indigenous students and all those taking Indigenous Studies courses
- Skills workshops held throughout the year and designed with the Indigenous learner in mind
- Student ambassadors work year-round to extend a welcoming hand to the community fostered by the FPHL
- Discover our shared Canadian history with an interactive virtual Blanket Exercise that brings greater empathy and better understanding of the land
- Dedicated training and supports for Two-Spirit people

Students are also given the opportunity to self-identify with their Indigenous ancestry, which helps Trent to provide the best cultural, academic, and support services possible.

Ishkodehwin: Anishnaabemowin for "Lighting your Inner Fire"

At Trent, you will find a community of support amongst your fellow students. Ishkodehwin is an on-campus student mentorship program that takes place throughout the academic year. Upper-year students act as a peer support for new students to assist them in their transition to Trent. The program is open to all first-year students who identify as First Nation, Inuit or Métis.

- 01 Giizhigaatig (Cedar Room) in Bata Library**
Giizhigaatig means honouring the sacred cedar tree. The name was chosen by local Elders for an Indigenous reading room in the Bata Library. With resources and space for students, Giizhigaatig is supported by the legacy of former Board chair Jalynn H. Bennett, and honours and recognizes local Michi Saagiig culture on campus.
- 02 Ernest and Florence Benedict Gathering Space**
This hub of activity is a bright and comfortable space where all are welcome. Here, students study and take part in an array of activities including ceremonies, socials, and workshops.

- 03 Elders Gathering**
Join hundreds of people from across the continent at this annual event. Alongside Elders and traditional peoples, you can share and experience Indigenous knowledge through workshops, presentations, and performances. You won't want to miss it.

- 04 Nozhem: First Peoples Performance Space**
This space on campus is a one-of-a-kind venue designed to allow the audience to interact with artists and performers. Unlike a traditional Western theatre, the space is designed to host ceremonies and to nurture Indigenous oral tradition, language, and knowledge.
- 05 Mnidoowag A'Kiing (the Spirit Lands)**
Trent University has a sweat lodge, three tipis, and a traditional wigwam between both the Peterborough and Durham GTA campuses, which serve as spaces for students to learn about ceremony and cultural teachings. The tipis also act as classroom space. Students are greeted by volunteer fire keepers who are trained in cultural protocol, safety, and are ambassadors for the space.
- 06 Indigenous Spaces at our Durham Campus**
At the Durham GTA campus you will find dedicated spaces for gathering and supporting cultural learning and activities, including a Tipi, an Indigenous Student Study Room and a future Medicine Garden, all supported through the First Peoples House of Learning.

Students in the **Transition Year Program** and the **Indigenous Environmental Studies** diplomas bring their diverse cultures, values, histories and languages to the classroom to get career-ready or to pursue further studies at the undergraduate level and beyond.

Indigenous students can prepare for a future in healthcare with the Foundations of **Indigenous Studies for Future Nursing Students Diploma** program receive university credit and students who complete the diploma and meet the requirements are admitted to the compressed Bachelor of Science in Nursing (B.Sc.N.) degree.

Boodweh Centre for Indigenous Knowledges and Languages

As a catalyst for new research, the Boodweh Centre for Indigenous Knowledges and Languages connects the University, local communities, and Elders in collaborative initiatives related to the exchange of Indigenous research and scholarship.

Enwayaang Institute for Professional Learning

The Enwayaang Professional Institute for Learning offers certificate courses for professionals who are looking to broaden and deepen their knowledge with respect to Indigenous peoples, Indigenous languages, and Indigenous/non-Indigenous relations.

Indigenous Environmental Institute

The Indigenous Environmental Institute (IEI) broadens the impact of Trent University's leadership in Indigenous and environmental education by delivering professional training to and facilitating critical conversations between sectors of the professional community. Positioned to help bolster Indigenous Environmental Science/Studies as a discipline, the IEI creates space for collaborations that bring together Indigenous and western knowledges as equally valuable, complementary ways of knowing.

ONTARIO HIGH SCHOOL MINIMUM ADMISSION REQUIREMENTS

Ontario secondary school students are required to have the following for admission to all programs:

- Ontario Secondary School Diploma with a minimum of six grade 12 4U or 4M courses
- A minimum 70% overall final average calculated using the top six grade 12 4U or 4M courses unless otherwise specified
- ENG4U with a minimum grade of 60%

PATHWAYS FOR INDIGENOUS CANADIAN STUDENTS

There are two application pathways if you are an Indigenous Canadian student:

1. Degree Program

Indigenous students who have followed a traditional academic path are eligible to apply to Trent directly through the degree program application process.

- Check the admission requirements for your program choices.
- Apply online through OUAC (Ontario Universities' Application Centre). Visit ouac.on.ca
- Select your application type: OUAC 101 or OUAC 105, then follow the steps provided.
- Trent University requires transcripts from all institutions you have attended.

2. Indigenous Diploma Programs

The Transition Year Program is an opportunity for First Nations, Métis, and Inuit students to begin their postsecondary studies. Students who complete the diploma may choose to pursue a Bachelor's degree, transferring their diploma credits. Most students are able to complete a diploma and degree in four years.

If you are applying to the Indigenous diploma program, you must submit an online application through the Ontario Universities' Application Centre (OUAC), as well as submit the Indigenous Diploma Supplemental Application Form directly through your myTrent portal.

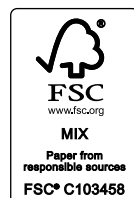
