

It also functions as an online CV, making it an ideal complement to the new narrative CV format soon to be rolled out by Canada's Tri-Agency funding councils. This session will introduce the benefits of ORCID, guide you through creating and populating your own ORCID iD and record, and demonstrate how it can be integrated into your research and publication workflows.

Having a DMP in place now will save considerable time and effort later and can increase the visibility and impact of your research. This practical session will take you through the process of completing a DMP using a simplified template designed for funding applications.
